DISCUSSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS MAGISTERIAL DISTRICT COURTS 59-3-01, 59-3-02, 59-3-03 CAMERON COUNTY AND ELK COUNTY

After every federal decennial census, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania mandates a review of the existence of and boundaries for magisterial district courts in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. President Judges are charged with the duty to review the caseload, workload, and overall scope of the magisterial districts in 59 of the 60 judicial districts statewide in order to reestablish, realign or eliminate magisterial districts.

The 59th Judicial District of Pennsylvania is composed of Elk County and Cameron County and is located in the northcentral mountainous region of the state in the heart of the Pennsylvania Wilds scenic area of Pennsylvania. Elk County is a 6th class county and has a population of 31,946. Cameron County is an 8th class county and has a population of 5,085. Both counties have experienced a decline in population since the 2000 census of 9% and 15% respectively.

Magisterial District 59-3-01 comprises all of Cameron County, serving the municipalities of the Boroughs of Emporium and Driftwood, and the Townships of Gibson, Grove, Lumber, Portage and Shippen. The court is located in the Cameron County Courthouse, 20 East Fifth Street, Emporium, Pa.

Magisterial District 59-3-02 is located generally in the northern and western sections of Elk County, serving the Boroughs of Johnsonburg and Ridgway, and the Townships of Highland, Horton, Jones, Millstone, Ridgway, and Spring Creek. The court is located at 409-G Center Street, Johnsonburg, Pa.

Magisterial District 59-3-03 is located generally in the southern and eastern section of Elk County, serving the City of St. Marys, and the Townships of Benezette, Fox, and Jay. The court is located at 810 South Michael Road, St. Marys, Pa.

Magisterial district courts handle criminal, private criminal, nontraffic, traffic, civil, landlord/tenant, and miscellaneous cases. Based upon filings from 2005-2010, the average caseload of the three magisterial districts is 2507 cases per year. Average caseload in District 59-3-01 is 1518 (40% below the judicial district average), in District 59-3-02 is 2989 (19% above the judicial district average), and in District 59-3-03 is 3015 (20% above the judicial district average).

Comparing the average caseload for District 59-3-01 (Cameron County) with the average caseload (2212) in other 8th class counties, District 59-3-01 had 31% fewer cases filed.

Comparing the average caseload for District 59-3-02 and District 59-3-03 with the average caseload (3263) in other 6th class counties, District 59-3-02 had 8% fewer cases filed and District 59-3-03 also had 8% fewer cases filed.

The workload of the magisterial district judge varies depending upon the type of case. For example, a magisterial district judge spends more time on a criminal case than on a traffic case. Therefore, a review of the workload is necessary.

The average workload for the judicial district is 19,718. The average workload in District 59-3-01 is 11,127 (43% below the judicial district average), in District 59-3-02 is 21,465 (8% above the judicial district average), and in District 59-3-03 is 26,561 (35% above the judicial district average).

Statistically, it is clear that District 59-3-01 is below the average workload benchmark of +/- 15% set by the Supreme Court, District 59-3-02 is within the benchmark, and District 59-3-03 is above the benchmark. Further review is needed regarding Districts 59-3-01 and 59-3-03 in order to determine if reestablishment, realignment and/or elimination is warranted.

Magisterial District 59-3-01 is the only district court serving the entire population of 5085 citizens of Cameron County, the least populated county in Pennsylvania since suffering a decline of 889 people or 15% in population from the 2000 census. The district court is the only 24/7 judicial presence in the county since the main judicial offices of the one Court of Common Pleas judge are located 30 miles from Emporium in Ridgway, Elk County, the judicial district's sister county. The one Cameron County local police department in Emporium Borough and the Pennsylvania State Police – Emporium Barracks rely on the district court for search warrants, arrest warrants, preliminary arraignments, setting of bail, and preliminary hearings. Citizens rely on the district court for emergency protection from abuse actions and the resolution of their civil, landlord/tenant, traffic, and nontraffic cases. Eliminating District Court 59-3-01 would be contrary to the fair and effective administration of justice in Cameron County.

District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County is bordered by three municipalities in Elk County: Jones Township, currently part of District Court 59-3-02, and the City of St. Marys and Benezette Township, both currently part of District Court 59-3-03. Aligning Jones Township with District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County is unworkable as there is no direct road access from the township to District Court 59-3-01. Quite literally, residents of Jones Township would drive past the offices of District Courts 59-3-02 and 59-3-03 on their way to District Court 59-3-01. With the average number of cases at 220 and an average workload of 870, the number of Jones Township cases filed and workload would not increase the average workload to reach the benchmark.

Similar stumbling blocks arise when considering aligning Benezette Township with District Court 59-3-01. Although State Route 555 travels through Benezette Township in Elk County and Gibson Township in Cameron County, the road cannot be considered a direct or convenient route to the district court office in Emporium, with almost an hour's drive between Benezette and Emporium. With the average number of cases at 43 and an average workload of 428, the number of Benezette Township cases filed and workload would not increase the average workload to reach the benchmark.

When considering the alignment of the City of St. Marys with District Court 59-3-01, access is not an issue as State Route 120 is a direct road from the city to the district court in Emporium. Adding the average number of cases (1221) and the average workload (11,382) would increase the filings and workload to the benchmark. However, removing the City of St. Marys, the largest municipality by far in the 59th Judicial District, from District Court 59-3-03 will only transfer the benchmark problem from District Court 59-3-01 to District Court 59-3-03 and create a magisterial district that crosses county lines, affects voting in the various St. Marys voting wards, and increases travel for City citizens and law enforcement. The current Magisterial District Judge for District Court 59-3-03 would then be required to move from his residence in the City of St. Marys.

One last alignment consideration involves moving the contiguous municipalities of Benezette, Jay, and Fox Townships in Elk County to District 59-3-01. The rural and sparsely populated areas of Benezette and Jay Townships would do little to add to the caseload and citizens again would be confronted with access to the district court in Emporium. Adding Fox Township, which is contiguous to Jay Township, would in effect add the average workload to District Court 59-3-01 and resolve the benchmark problem but would not resolve the benchmark problem in District Court 59-3-03, and create a magisterial district that crosses county lines, affect voting in the three townships' voting wards, and increase travel for the citizens and law enforcement.

For the above reasons, I recommend that District Court 59-3-01 be reestablished to serve all of Cameron County, encompassing the Boroughs of Emporium and Driftwood and the Townships of Gibson, Grove, Lumber, Portage, and Shippen.

Turning to Magisterial District Court 59-3-03, the average workload exceeds 35% of the average workload in the judicial district. However, it must be noted that the workload average for the two Elk County magisterial district courts is 24,013. District 59-3-02 is 10% below the county average and District Court 59-3-03 is 10% above the county average, both well within the benchmark. Including District 59-3-01/Cameron County, the 8th class county having 1/6 the population of Elk County, in the judicial district workload average skews the

workload average, and results in District Court 59-3-03 exceeding the benchmark.

The alignment of the City of St. Marys with District Court 59-3-01 has been previously discussed and would only serve to transfer the problem from one district court to another. The alignment of Benezette, Fox, and Jay Townships with District Court 59-3-01 would not resolve the benchmark problem either, resulting in a small decrease but creating a logistical, topographical, voting and access dilemma.

Therefore, consideration must be given to aligning other municipalities within Elk County between District Court 59-3-03 to District Court 59-3-02. Again, removing the anomaly that is District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County from the equation for average caseload and workload, both district courts in Elk County are within the benchmark and there is no reason to realign the municipalities served by the Elk County district courts.

For the above reasons, I recommend that District Court 59-3-02 be reestablished to serve the northern and western parts of Elk County, encompassing the Boroughs of Johnsonburg and Ridgway and the Townships of Highland, Horton, Jones, Millstone, Ridgway, and Spring Creek.

As stated hereinabove, I also recommend that District Court 59-3-03 be reestablished to serve the southern and eastern parts of Elk County, encompassing the City of St. Marys and the Townships of Benezette, Fox and Jay.





DISCUSSION AND RECOMMENDATIONS MAGISTERIAL DISTRICT COURTS 59-3-01, 59-3-02, 59-3-03 CAMERON COUNTY AND ELK COUNTY

After every federal decennial census, the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania mandates a review of the existence of and boundaries for magisterial district courts in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. President Judges are charged with the duty to review the caseload, workload, and overall scope of the magisterial districts in 59 of the 60 judicial districts statewide in order to reestablish, realign or eliminate magisterial districts.

The 59th Judicial District of Pennsylvania is composed of Elk County and Cameron County and is located in the northcentral mountainous region of the state in the heart of the Pennsylvania Wilds scenic area of Pennsylvania. Elk County is a 6th class county and has a population of 31,946. Cameron County is an 8th class county and has a population of 5,085. Both counties have experienced a decline in population since the 2000 census of 9% and 15% respectively.

Magisterial District 59-3-01 comprises all of Cameron County, serving the municipalities of the Boroughs of Emporium and Driftwood, and the Townships of Gibson, Grove, Lumber, Portage and Shippen. The court is located in the Cameron County Courthouse, 20 East Fifth Street, Emporium, Pa.

Magisterial District 59-3-02 is located generally in the northern and western sections of Elk County, serving the Boroughs of Johnsonburg and Ridgway, and the Townships of Highland, Horton, Jones, Millstone, Ridgway, and Spring Creek. The court is located at 409-G Center Street, Johnsonburg, Pa.

Magisterial District 59-3-03 is located generally in the southern and eastern section of Elk County, serving the City of St. Marys, and the Townships of Benezette, Fox, and Jay. The court is located at 810 South Michael Road, St. Marys, Pa.

Magisterial district courts handle criminal, private criminal, nontraffic, traffic, civil, landlord/tenant, and miscellaneous cases. Based upon filings from 2005-2010, the average caseload of the three magisterial districts is 2507 cases per year. Average caseload in District 59-3-01 is 1518 (40% below the judicial district average), in District 59-3-02 is 2989 (19% above the judicial district average), and in District 59-3-03 is 3015 (20% above the judicial district average).

Comparing the average caseload for District 59-3-01 (Cameron County) with the average caseload (2212) in other 8th class counties, District 59-3-01 had 31% fewer cases filed.

Comparing the average caseload for District 59-3-02 and District 59-3-03 with the average caseload (3263) in other 6th class counties, District 59-3-02 had 8% fewer cases filed and District 59-3-03 also had 8% fewer cases filed.

The workload of the magisterial district judge varies depending upon the type of case. For example, a magisterial district judge spends more time on a criminal case than on a traffic case. Therefore, a review of the workload is necessary.

The average workload for the judicial district is 19,718. The average workload in District 59-3-01 is 11,127 (43% below the judicial district average), in District 59-3-02 is 21,465 (8% above the judicial district average), and in District 59-3-03 is 26,561 (35% above the judicial district average).

Statistically, it is clear that District 59-3-01 is below the average workload benchmark of +/- 15% set by the Supreme Court, District 59-3-02 is within the benchmark, and District 59-3-03 is above the benchmark. Further review is needed regarding Districts 59-3-01 and 59-3-03 in order to determine if reestablishment, realignment and/or elimination is warranted.

Magisterial District 59-3-01 is the only district court serving the entire population of 5085 citizens of Cameron County, the least populated county in Pennsylvania since suffering a decline of 889 people or 15% in population from the 2000 census. The district court is the only 24/7 judicial presence in the county since the main judicial offices of the one Court of Common Pleas judge are located 30 miles from Emporium in Ridgway, Elk County, the judicial district's sister county. The one Cameron County local police department in Emporium Borough and the Pennsylvania State Police – Emporium Barracks rely on the district court for search warrants, arrest warrants, preliminary arraignments, setting of bail, and preliminary hearings. Citizens rely on the district court for emergency protection from abuse actions and the resolution of their civil, landlord/tenant, traffic, and nontraffic cases. Eliminating District Court 59-3-01 would be contrary to the fair and effective administration of justice in Cameron County.

District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County is bordered by three municipalities in Elk County: Jones Township, currently part of District Court 59-3-02, and the City of St. Marys and Benezette Township, both currently part of District Court 59-3-03. Aligning Jones Township with District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County is unworkable as there is no direct road access from the township to District Court 59-3-01. Quite literally, residents of Jones Township would drive past the offices of District Courts 59-3-02 and 59-3-03 on their way to District Court 59-3-01. With the average number of cases at 220 and an average workload of 870, the number of Jones Township cases filed and workload would not increase the average workload to reach the benchmark.

Similar stumbling blocks arise when considering aligning Benezette Township with District Court 59-3-01. Although State Route 555 travels through Benezette Township in Elk County and Gibson Township in Cameron County, the road cannot be considered a direct or convenient route to the district court office in Emporium, with almost an hour's drive between Benezette and Emporium. With the average number of cases at 43 and an average workload of 428, the number of Benezette Township cases filed and workload would not increase the average workload to reach the benchmark.

When considering the alignment of the City of St. Marys with District Court 59-3-01, access is not an issue as State Route 120 is a direct road from the city to the district court in Emporium. Adding the average number of cases (1221) and the average workload (11,382) would increase the filings and workload to the benchmark. However, removing the City of St. Marys, the largest municipality by far in the 59th Judicial District, from District Court 59-3-03 will only transfer the benchmark problem from District Court 59-3-01 to District Court 59-3-03 and create a magisterial district that crosses county lines, affects voting in the various St. Marys voting wards, and increases travel for City citizens and law enforcement. The current Magisterial District Judge for District Court 59-3-03 would then be required to move from his residence in the City of St. Marys.

One last alignment consideration involves moving the contiguous municipalities of Benezette, Jay, and Fox Townships in Elk County to District 59-3-01. The rural and sparsely populated areas of Benezette and Jay Townships would do little to add to the caseload and citizens again would be confronted with access to the district court in Emporium. Adding Fox Township, which is contiguous to Jay Township, would in effect add the average workload to District Court 59-3-01 and resolve the benchmark problem but would not resolve the benchmark problem in District Court 59-3-03, and create a magisterial district that crosses county lines, affect voting in the three townships' voting wards, and increase travel for the citizens and law enforcement.

For the above reasons, I recommend that District Court 59-3-01 be reestablished to serve all of Cameron County, encompassing the Boroughs of Emporium and Driftwood and the Townships of Gibson, Grove, Lumber, Portage, and Shippen.

Turning to Magisterial District Court 59-3-03, the average workload exceeds 35% of the average workload in the judicial district. However, it must be noted that the workload average for the two Elk County magisterial district courts is 24,013. District 59-3-02 is 10% below the county average and District Court 59-3-03 is 10% above the county average, both well within the benchmark. Including District 59-3-01/Cameron County, the 8th class county having 1/6 the population of Elk County, in the judicial district workload average skews the

workload average, and results in District Court 59-3-03 exceeding the benchmark.

The alignment of the City of St. Marys with District Court 59-3-01 has been previously discussed and would only serve to transfer the problem from one district court to another. The alignment of Benezette, Fox, and Jay Townships with District Court 59-3-01 would not resolve the benchmark problem either, resulting in a small decrease but creating a logistical, topographical, voting and access dilemma.

Therefore, consideration must be given to aligning other municipalities within Elk County between District Court 59-3-03 to District Court 59-3-02. Again, removing the anomaly that is District Court 59-3-01/Cameron County from the equation for average caseload and workload, both district courts in Elk County are within the benchmark and there is no reason to realign the municipalities served by the Elk County district courts.

For the above reasons, I recommend that District Court 59-3-02 be reestablished to serve the northern and western parts of Elk County, encompassing the Boroughs of Johnsonburg and Ridgway and the Townships of Highland, Horton, Jones, Millstone, Ridgway, and Spring Creek.

As stated hereinabove, I also recommend that District Court 59-3-03 be reestablished to serve the southern and eastern parts of Elk County, encompassing the City of St. Marys and the Townships of Benezette, Fox and Jay.




