PENNSYLVANIA CONSTITUTION

Orginally written in

1787

The U.S. Constitution was signed on Sept. 17 – known as **Constitution Day**.

Required ratification by **nine of the 13 states** to become
binding. On June 21, 1788 the ninth state (New Hampshire) ratified it.
The U.S. Constitution became effective in March 1789.



Both constitutions were signed in the Pa. State House, known as

Independence Hall – the same building where the Declaration of Independence was signed.



FUN FACTS

The most misspelled word in the U.S. Constitution is Pennsylvania - spelled "Pensylvania."

A proclamation by President George Washington and a congressional resolution established the first national Thanksgiving Day on Nov. 26, 1789. The reason for the holiday was to give "thanks" for the new Constitution.

AMENDED 113 TIMES SINCE 1776

Article V of the Pa. Constitution established the Pa. Supreme Court along with the state's two intermediate appellate courts, trial courts and limited jurisdiction courts (magisterial district courts and Philadelphia municipal courts).

Pennsylvania's Constitution provides **more rights** and protections than the federal constitution.

For example, Pa. Constitution Art. 1, Sec. 8 generally provides more protection against unreasonable search and seizure than the 4th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution.
