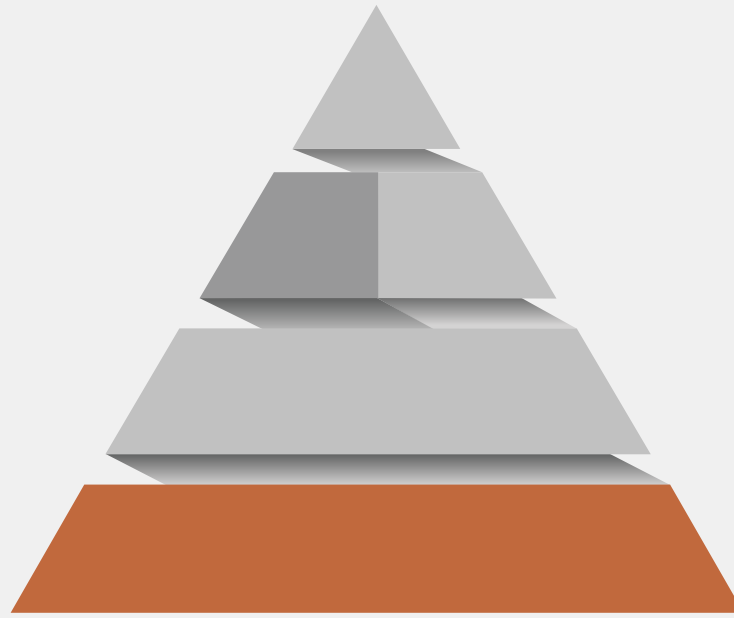


How Pennsylvania's Magisterial District Courts and Municipal Courts Operate

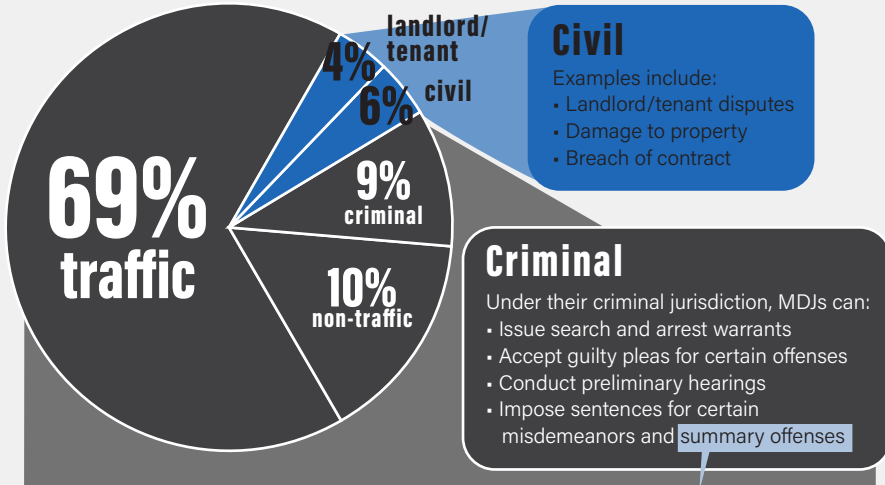


What are Magisterial District and Municipal courts?

Magisterial District or Municipal courts are where most people have their first experience with the judicial system. Magisterial District Judges (MDJs) handle civil cases with claim amounts up to \$12,000, summary matters and have initial jurisdiction over all criminal cases. Unique to Philadelphia, Philadelphia Municipal Court (PMC) judges also preside over misdemeanor bench trials when the maximum penalty is prison less than five years.

Pennsylvania has

509 MDJs 
27 PMC judges



Civil

Examples include:

- Landlord/tenant disputes
- Damage to property
- Breach of contract

Criminal

Under their criminal jurisdiction, MDJs can:

- Issue search and arrest warrants
- Accept guilty pleas for certain offenses
- Conduct preliminary hearings
- Impose sentences for certain misdemeanors and summary offenses

Summary offenses

These include traffic and non-traffic offenses and are the most minor criminal offense in Pennsylvania. Summary cases do not require a jury and may result in fines, costs and sometimes restitution. Examples include:

- Disorderly conduct
- Speeding
- Underage drinking

Other MDJ duties:

- May perform marriage ceremonies
- Fix and set bail
- Issue emergency Protection From Abuse orders (PFAs)
