Cases are generally heard by groups or panels of three judges



but can be heard by a single judge or by *en banc* panels of seven judges.

One of two statewide intermediate appellate courts that

work to determine if errors were made at the trial court level.

- Only court like it in the country, specializing in issues of state and local government and administrative law.
- Commonwealth Court issues decisions that affect the relationship between state and local government and the citizens of Pennsylvania, dealing with issues such as how we elect our local officials, care for our elderly, protect our environment, and educate our children.
- Not only hears appeals, but sometimes sits like a trial court in certain cases, such as a constitutional challenge to a state law or a tax dispute.
